Option 1: Use of Ativan (Lorazepam):

For all protocols which state "Valium", substitute Ativan

- Adult Dosage: 2mg, IV Push. Repeat every 5 minutes until seizure is suppressed or a total of 10mg administered
- Pediatric Dosage: 0.05 to 0.1mg/kg to a maximum of 2mg. Repeat every 5 minutes until seizure is suppressed

NOTE: The storage and/or replacement of Ativan MUST be in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendation (refrigerate or replace as recommended by the manufacturer)

Option 2: Use of Versed:

For all protocols which state "Valium", substitute Versed

- Dosage for patients >12 and <65 y/o: 2.5 mg IV
- Dosage for patients >65: 1.5 mg IV (may give 1 additional mg in 2-3 min. if needed)
- Dosage for patients 2 month to 12 y/o: 0.15 mg/kg IV up to a max of 2.5 mg
- If seizures are not controlled following administration of Versed, notify medical direction for additional orders.

This is a temporary variance and strictly to be used when Valium is unavailable from the supplier and you are in short supply.

So long as the shortage continues, services selecting Option 1 may replace Valium with Ativan on the MICU Medication List and must maintain a stock of at least 20mg of Ativan.

Services selecting Option 2 may remove Valium from the MICU Medication list; as long as the shortage continues.

This variance will remain in effect until Valium is available once again from the manufacturer.

You will need to place a copy of this letter in each protocol book in each ambulance.
